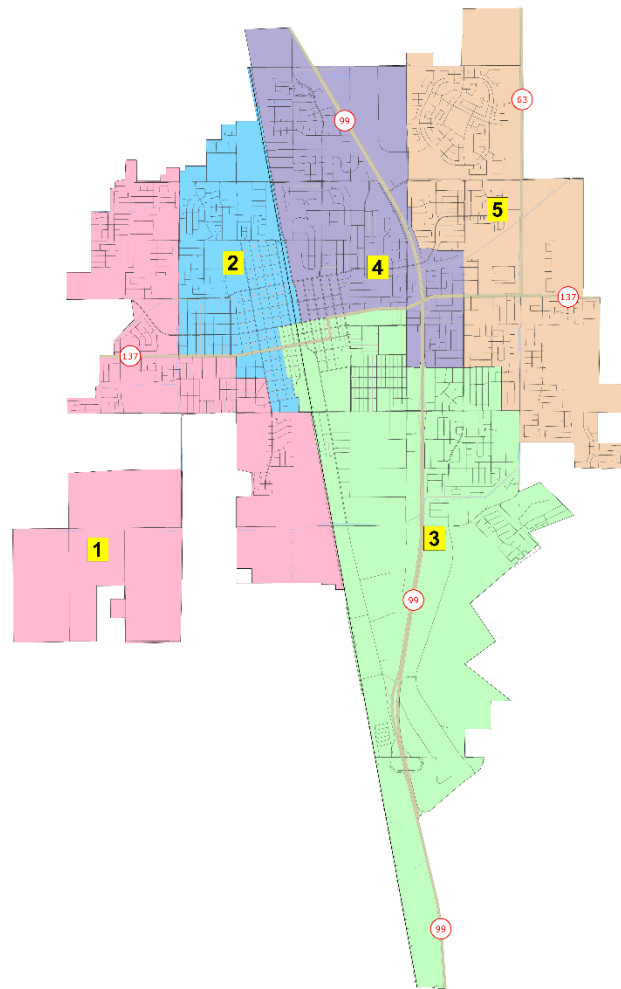

Redistricting Process

Step	Description
Two Initial Hearings May 4 & July 20	• Held prior to release of draft maps. • Education and to solicit input on the communities in the Districts.
Census Data Release Mid/Late August	• Census Bureau releases official 2020 Census population data.
California Data Release Early October 2021	• California Statewide Database releases California's official 'prisoner-adjusted' 2020 redistricting data.
Draft Map Hearing January 18, 2022	• Discuss and revise the draft maps • Discuss the election sequence • Deadline to submit draft maps: January 4, 2022, 5 p.m. • Post draft maps by January 11, 2022, 5 p.m.
Draft Map Hearing February 22, 2022	• Discuss and select final map • Discuss and determine election sequence • Deadline to submit draft maps: February 8, 2022, 5 p.m. • Post draft maps by February 15, 2022, 5 p.m.
Map Adoption By April 17, 2022	• Final map must be posted at least 7 days prior to adoption. • Map adopted via ordinance.*

Redistricting Rules and Goals

1. Federal Laws

Equal Population
Federal Voting Rights Act
No Racial Gerrymandering



2. California Criteria for Cities

Geographically contiguous
Undivided neighborhoods and “communities of interest”
(Socio-economic geographic areas that should be kept together)
Easily identifiable boundaries
Compact
(Do not bypass one group of people to get to a more distant group of people)

Prohibited:

“Shall not favor or discriminate against a political party.”

3. Other Traditional Redistricting Principles

Minimize voters shifted to different election years
Respect voters’ choices / continuity in office
Future population growth
Preserving the core of existing districts

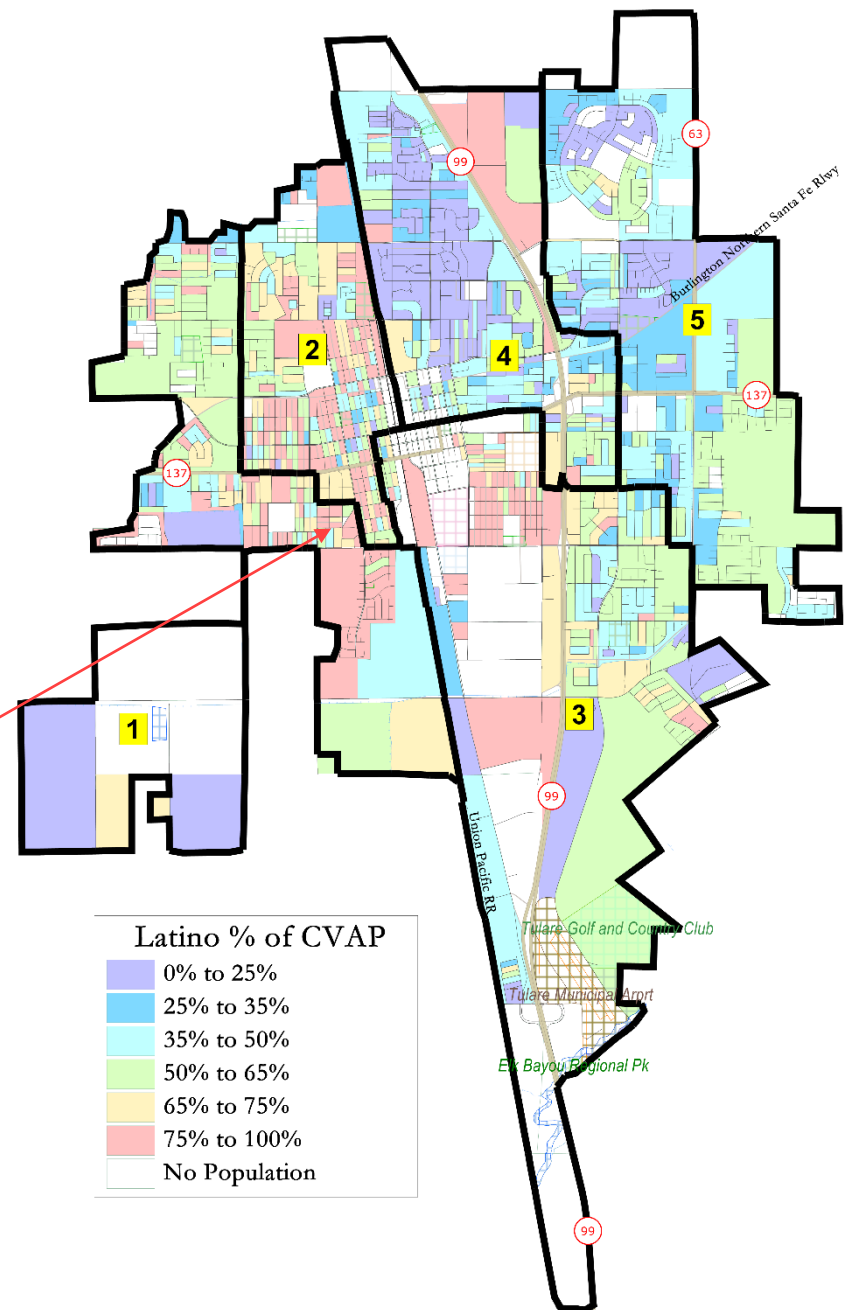

Latinos are particularly in current Districts 1, 2 and the part of District 3 west of Hwy 99.



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Defining Neighborhoods

1st Question: What is your neighborhood?

2nd Question: What are its geographic boundaries?

Examples of physical features defining a neighborhood boundary:

- Natural neighborhood dividing lines, such as highway or major roads, rivers, canals and/or hills
- Areas around parks or schools
- Other neighborhood landmarks

In the absence of public testimony, planning records and other similar documents may provide definition.



Beyond Neighborhoods: Communities

Under the California Elections Code, “community of interest” has a very specific definition in the context of districting and redistricting cities and counties:

A “community of interest” is a population that shares common social or economic interests that should be included within a single district for purposes of its effective and fair representation.

Communities of interest do not include relationships with political parties, incumbents, or political candidates.

(emphasis added)

Beyond Neighborhoods: Defining Communities of Interest

1st Question: What defines your community?

- Geographic Area, plus
- Shared issue or characteristic
 - Shared social or economic interest
 - Impacted by city policies
- Tell us “your community’s story”

2nd Question: Would this community benefit from being “included within a single district for purposes of its effective and fair representation”?

- Or would it benefit more from having multiple representatives?

Definitions of Communities of Interest may not include relationships with political parties, incumbents, or political candidates.

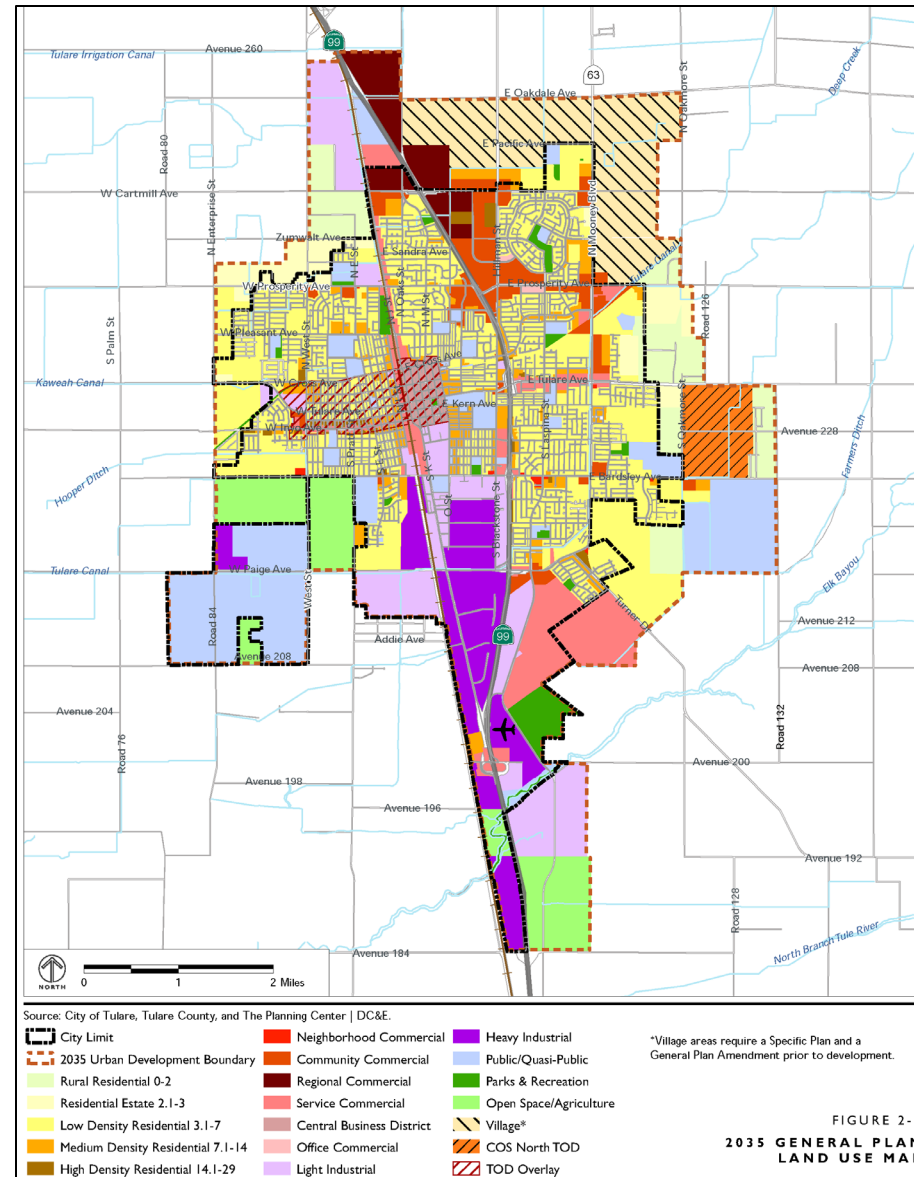
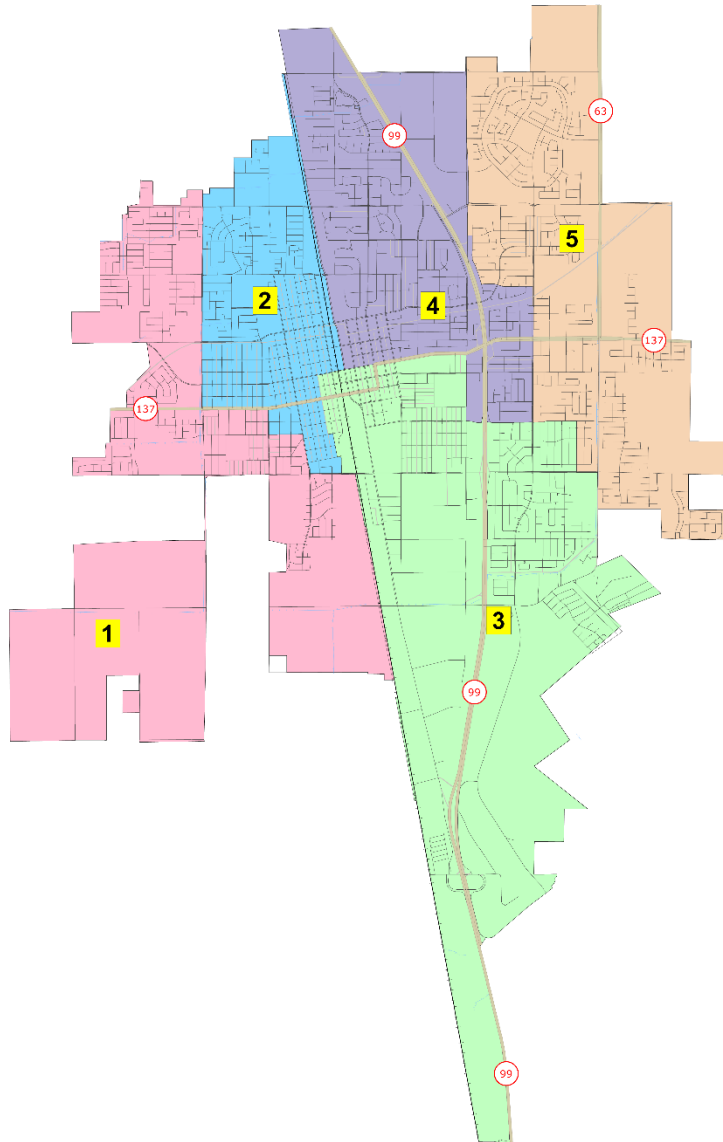


FIGURE 2-2

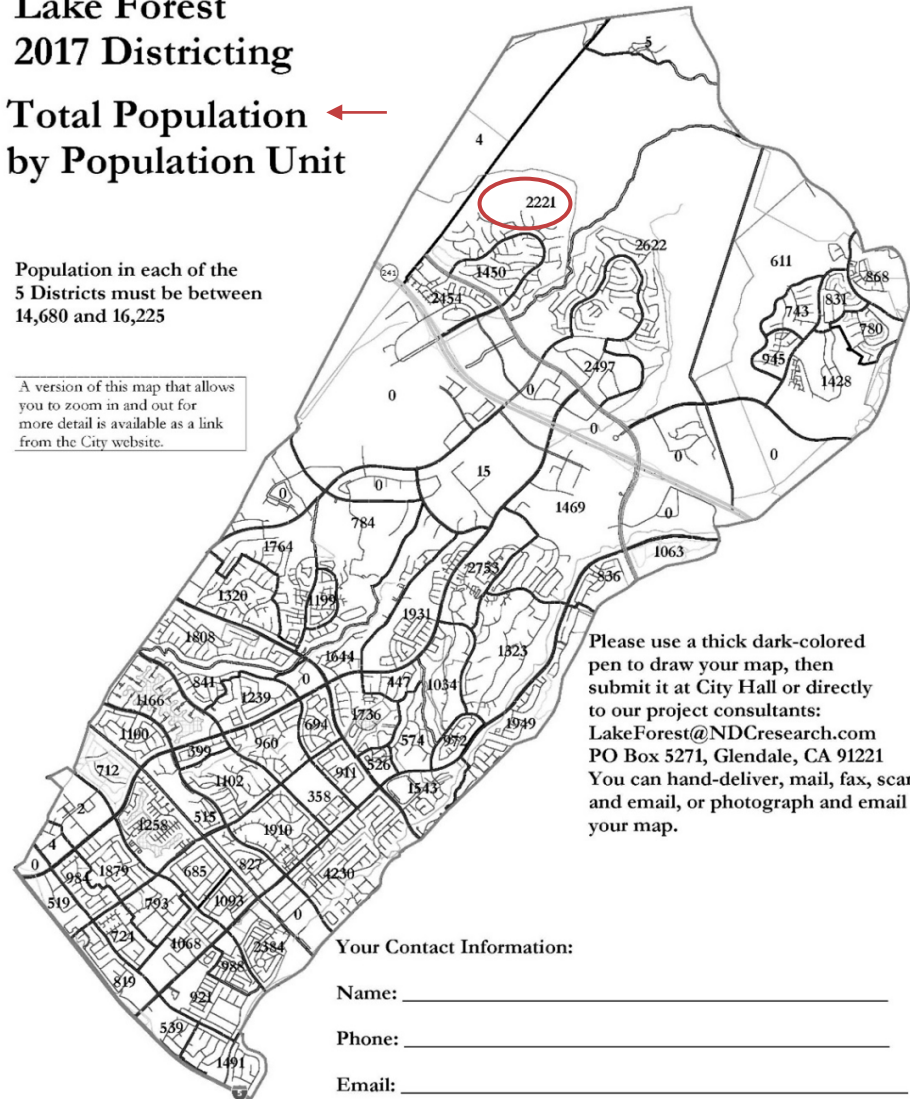

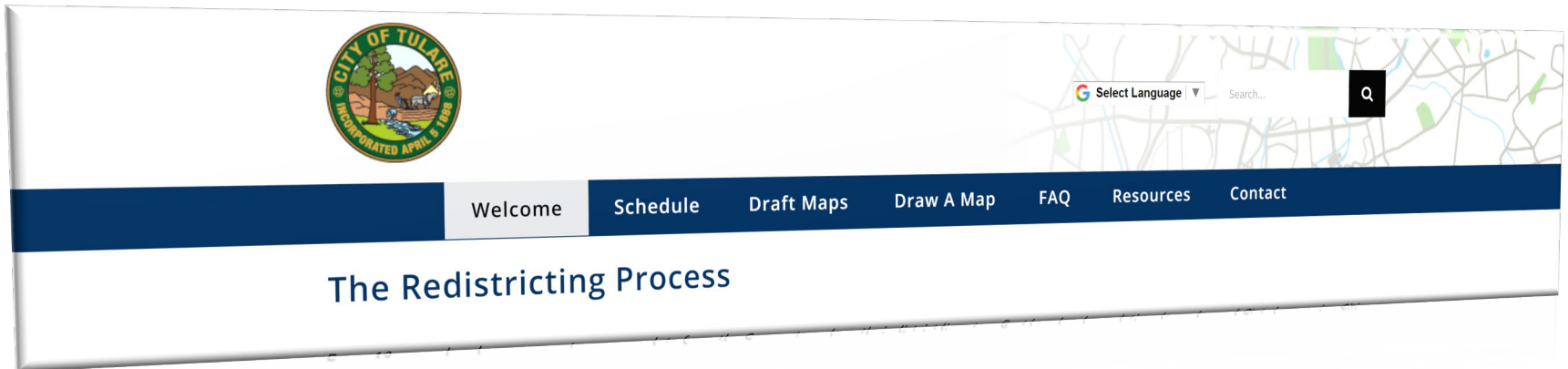
